## **Putting Pension Reform in Perspective**

One of the hottest topics for the media these days is pension reform. It's not just a local issue, but one that is drawing a great deal of attention statewide and nationally. It is important to you and it is important to the County as we continue to deal with revenue impacts related to the struggling economy and the uncertainty of State budget cuts.

We in Orange County have already taken the first steps in the pension reform process. A new 1.62 @ 65 pension formula is offered to new employees represented by several bargaining units. We hope that we can get a favorable ruling from the IRS so that existing

employees will be allowed the opportunity to select the new 1.62 at 65 pension formula, which includes a County matching contribution to a Defined Contribution Plan.

You may have heard that the Governor recently announced a 12 point pension reform proposal, which includes several bills now pending in the Legislature. You may have also heard about the Little Hoover Commission report on pension reform, which can be found at <a href="http://www.lhc.ca.gov/studies/204/report204.html">http://www.lhc.ca.gov/studies/204/report204.html</a>. I would recommend that you become familiar with the Commission's report because it provides an overview of many of the issues associated with pension reform.

The bottom line is that contributions toward employee pensions are requiring more and more dollars at a time when those dollars are harder to come by. Many local governments find themselves in the difficult position of having to reduce services to the public in order to fund their pension contributions. The public is concerned about this trend and the voices calling for pension reform are growing louder.

There are no easy solutions to this problem. It is going to take a coordinated and cooperative approach between employers, employees and employee representation groups to come up with the long-term solutions that will reduce unfunded pension liabilities. **Change will be essential** to ensuring that public employee retirement programs are secure and adequately funded. As I said earlier, it is important to you and it is important to the County.

# Census Data Shows Changes in Orange County

Data from the 2010 Census shows that Orange County grew at a slower rate in recent years than some counties in southern California and the State of California as a whole. While California grew by ten percent in the last decade, Orange County's population growth was measured at 5.8%. That brings Orange County's total population to 3,010,232 or almost 164,000 more residents than in 2000.

The Census also found changes in population in Orange County's five Supervisorial Districts that will be examined as part of the Redistricting process conducted every ten years in coordination with the release of Census information. The Third Supervisorial District grew the most in the past decade, adding over 93,000 residents, while Census results showed the First District lost approximately 5,700 residents. Census results also show

continued changes in the County's racial and ethnic composition.

The County's Redistricting process is well underway with a committee now meeting on a regular basis to provide leadership. Between April 4 and May 18, individuals and organizations can submit Redistricting proposals to adjust Supervisorial Districts in a manner that makes them as equal in population as possible. More information on Redistricting and the process of submitting a proposal is available on the County website at http://egov.ocgov.com/ocgov/Government/Redistricting.

The Redistricting process must be completed this year, so a proposal for changes to District boundaries is expected to be submitted to the Board of Supervisors in July for their consideration.

## Registrar of Voters Achieves Successful Election

On March 8th, the Registrar of Voters (ROV) team | field ready to respond to any problems." conducted the City of San Clemente Special Municipal Election.


Nearly 44% of the 41,332 registered voters turned out to vote – a participation rate much higher than the typical 10-25% special election average. 68% of the ballots received were vote-by-mail, including those dropped off at the polls.

The ROV staffed 25 polling places with over 100 trained volunteers. "It was a relatively guiet election with minimal issues at polling places," said Neal Kelley, Registrar of Voters. "The Department had five rapid deployment teams, eight field coordinators and one mobile generator truck in the

#### **Volunteer Probation Officer John Leahy**



After proudly serving his country for 22 years as a United States Marine, VPO Leahy joined the Orange County Sheriff's Department for another 26 years and attained the rank of Lieutenant. Today, John volunteers his time in Veterans Court (VC) and Recovery Court (RC). The adult probationers he supports include combat veterans suffering from Post Traumatic Stress Disorder, and Traumatic Brain Injury, as well as offenders with co-occurring mental illness and substance abuse issues. John is seen as a role model, especially by combat veterans, and his impact on the lives of VC and RC participants is evidenced by the progress his probationers make throughout the court process. Since 2007, John has contributed over 3,029 hours of his time to the Probation Department, 1,461 hours of which has been dedicated to VC and RC. "His service to his country and his

county has truly been phenomenal and we are all better for it, said Chief Probation Officer Steven Sentman. "He is an inspiration."

Marilyn Jones's service to probation youth has been immeasurable. Following a 31-year career with the Orange County Probation Department, Marilyn joined the youthful offender population in Orange County as a volunteer case manager for the MatchPoint® Orange County Mentoring/Reentry Project. - 1. Built almost 40 years ago, Dana Point Harbor has slowly progressed to a focal point for the surrounding communities. The vision and influence of local stakeholders, city, and County staff will result in Dana Point Harbor slowly emerging as a revitalized, fresh asset dedicated to maintaining the spirit and character unique to Dana Point Harbor.
- 2. Dana Point Harbor has both landside and waterside components that provide services, opportunities, and enjoyment to thousands of visitors every year. There are two marinas with approximately 2,400 boat slips and a variety of recreational, sporting, and commercial boating amenities.
- 3. The landside uses in the Harbor include Dana Wharf and Mariner's Village for shopping and dining, the Marina Inn, the Ocean Institute, Baby Beach, and the County-operated OC Sailing and Events Center. There is a walking trail allowing people to travel the entire perimeter of the Harbor on foot, and public parking on both the cove side and island. Benches and grassy areas provide relaxing resting areas next to the water.
