Registrar of Voters Website Wins Award

Not only did the Orange County Registrar of Voters (ROV) department conduct successful Presidential Primary and General Elections this year, it received a prestigious award for its website.

In October, the National Digital Government Achievement Award was presented to ROV for its website, ocvote.com, which was recognized for its ease of accessibility, unique features, overall information and design. The new website, which debuted in April 2012, allows voters to access all of their election information through a "voter portal." This includes voter registration information, ballot tracking and polling place information. ROV is responsible for conducting elections in the fifth largest voting jurisdiction in the United States with 1.6 million registered voters.

ROV was recognized in the Government-to-Citizen Local Government category of the competition. The Digital Government Achievement Awards recognize outstanding agency and departmental websites and projects. "Digital technology has fundamentally changed the way people interact with their government and we are seeing it demonstrated through everything from full service portals to special purpose mobile apps," said Todd Sander, Executive Director of the Center for Digital Government. "We're excited about the opportunities governments are creating to make new things possible and to do the old things faster and more efficiently."

Headache-Free Travel at John Wayne Airport

CEO Intern Katie Stolting Shares her Observations

As the holidays approach and plans to visit family begin to form, we all start thinking of the looming travel days. It's no secret that traveling during the winter holidays can be a hassle, but this year – with proper preparation - it doesn't have to be.

John Wayne Airport (JWA) is home to eleven airlines traveling to twenty-two direct destinations. Customer Service Supervisor Kim Brown and her staff work to ensure all 9 million travelers who pass through JWA annually

have a positive experience. She shared some tips for how to make your holiday travel headache-free.

Travelers are encouraged to arrive at the airport at least 90 minutes before their scheduled flight departure. If your flight leaves earlier in the morning, it is encouraged that you allow extra time, as there is more traffic. The heaviest travel days are Monday and Tuesday, as JWA is largely a commuter airport.

If you have time to spare, you can take advantage of the numerous restaurants and stores in the terminals of JWA. With offerings such as California Pizza Kitchen, Anaheim Ducks Breakaway Bar & Grill, and Ruby's Diner To-Go, spending time in the airport is easier than ever. Travelers can see artwork from Orange County artists and take advantage of the numerous work stations with power outlets and free Wi-Fi throughout the Terminals.

If you're looking for a quiet place to wait for your departure time, venture down to the very end of Terminal A. Kim showed me what they call the "commuter terminal," because it's where many of the commuter aircraft depart in the morning. In the afternoon, however, this part of the airport is a nice, quiet place to wait out your flight. *(Continued on page 3)*

One of the biggest complaints Kim's team receives is about the time it takes to get through security. The holiday season brings the most travelers to any airport. It's important to remember that TSA security processes are standard – they do not change with the high volume of travelers. Here are some tips to keep in mind before going through the security screening:

- Have your government-issued photo ID and boarding pass ready at the entrance to the screening area. Travelers younger than 18 are not required to show identification.
- All wrapped gifts are subject to search, even if they're in checked bags. Save the wrapping for when you arrive at your destination.
- Pack liquids in your checked luggage. If you're only traveling with carry-on luggage, remember the 3-1-1 rule (3 ounce liquid bottles may be carried in a 1-quart bag, only 1 bag per traveler).

• Never leave your luggage unattended in the terminal, and report unattended baggage to security personnel.

Remember to keep track of your belongings! The last department of the airport anyone wants to find themselves in is lost and found. JWA's lost and found is located in Terminal A by the baggage claim area. If a traveler loses an item in the airport, this is where it ends up. However, if something is lost on an airplane, each airline has individual policies for lost articles.

If you should find yourself traveling through John Wayne this holiday season, feel free to stop by any of the customer service outlets and Kim's team will be able to help you.

DA's Office and Partners Provide Thanksgiving Dinners for At-Risk Youth



475 students were awarded hope for a gang-free future and a turkey dinner as a direct result of an OC GRIP initiative

For the third year, at-risk students who succeeded in an Orange County Gang Reduction Intervention Partnership (OC GRIP) challenge to improve their attendance, behavior, and grades were awarded a complete turkey dinner.

The dinners, donated by Ralph's, Food 4 Less, and Saddleback Church, came complete with turkey, dressing, and all the staples of a traditional holiday meal. Volunteers from the sponsoring partners were on hand to assemble approximately 475 dinners, each large enough for a family of 10.

Through the efforts of volunteers from Saddleback Church and Ralph's grocery, the bags were packed and the food was ready for delivery in just a few hours. Volunteers took the meals to various Orange County elementary and middle schools where students were able to pick them up for their families. "I am truly humbled and grateful to Saddleback Church, Ralphs, and Food 4 Less for bringing Thanksgiving to so many needy and deserving children," said District Attorney Tony Rackauckas. "I am thrilled for the opportunity for these children to do something good for their families and praise them for learning that there are rewards for good behavior."

The OC GRIP program gives at-risk youth hope to succeed, as Orange Police Chief Robert Gustafson stated in an address to volunteers. The program has seen a dramatic improvement in attendance at participating schools. In the past, participants have seen many incentives such as the turkey dinners and Angels baseball tickets.

OC GRIP currently operates in eight cities and is run by the Orange County District Attorney's Office, Orange County Probation Department, Orange County Sheriff's Department, Buena Park Police Department, Garden Grove Police Department, Orange Police Department, Santa Ana Police Department, and the Santa Ana Unified School District Police. The program has over 400 community partners.

Operation Santa Claus is a County of Orange program that provides nearly 45,000 toys and gifts annually to local kids and teens in foster care, group homes, and in transition who have been homeless, abused, neglected, or who are physically or mentally challenged. The program, approved by our Board of Supervisors and administered by the Social Services Agency (SSA), has received critical support from County employees and community partners since its inception in 1962.

Senior Santa & Friends distributes special request items and gifts to low-income individuals who are elderly or severely disabled adults and clients of SSA and the Health Care Agency. Each year, staff identifies clients who would benefit from receiving household appliances, special medical equipment, nutritional supplements, or clothing. In 2011, over 2,600 folks received items through the program – helping them to become more comfortable or independent.

Special honors were presented during the October 30 Board of Supervisors meeting to staff from three County of Orange departments who played a role in their agency's winning entries in the 2012 California State Association of Counties (CSAC) Challenge Awards program.

The Social Services Agency received CSAC's highest honors, the Challenge Award, for its Doing More with Less in Orange County proaram. This program was designed to efficiently address increased workloads and decreased resources by transitioning from case-based to task-based service delivery. The Health Care Agency received a Merit Award for its Leadership Development Program, a three-track training approach that provides employees with ongoing personal and professional development opportunities. Finally, the Office of the Performance Audit Director received a Merit Award for Excellence through Performance Auditing. Orange County established the first county

Get the 411 on Housing and Community Development/ Homeless Prevention

- 1. Housing and Community Development/Homeless Prevention is a Division of OC Community Services that administers the County's affordable housing development, community development and homeless prevention programs and activities.
- 2. Since 1999, over 2,500 units of affordable rental housing have been approved by the Board of Supervisors through the Affordable Rental Housing Program. This program provides loans to developers in exchange for long-term affordability restrictions.
- 3. Homeless Prevention coordinates the federally required Point in Time Count that occurs every other January to count sheltered and unsheltered homeless persons. If you would like to volunteer to help with the 2013 Point in Time Count, please visit www.pointintimeoc.org.
- 4. Homeless Prevention is responsible for the completion of a Federal grant for Continuum of Care Homeless Assistance funding which results in \$16 million annually awarded to local agencies to provide homeless services and housing.
