I started last month's column with a quote so here's another from the Greek philosopher Heraclitus that seems apropos: "The only constant in life is change."

There are few tips I've picked up by reading best-practice articles and from advice provided by friends and family regarding how to survive and benefit from change that I thought I'd share:

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
Kamal Singh: Orange County Taxpayers' Concierge

Treasurer-Tax Collector Shari Freidenrich has engaged her office on a trailblazing quest—of the internet kind. Employees of the Treasurer-Tax Collector (TTC) are encouraged to hunt for ways to bring services closer to the public by providing taxpayers easier access to information online, including paying property tax bills with a click instead of a stamp. On its homepage, the TTC allows a taxpayer to print a property tax bill without having to contact the office directly.

More than 55% of property taxes are now being paid electronically instead of being mailed.

It's a win-win situation for both taxpayers and the TTC because public

information is readily available for self-service, reduces the number of incoming phone calls to the office and improves customer service.



No one agrees more than Kamal Singh, who interacts daily with the public as the taxpayer service manager, overseeing three busy retail centers: the public service counter, the call center and the remittance center. Not a position for the faint at heart.

Juggling these TTC outlets is a reflection of Kamal's 28 years of collective experience at the Offices of the Assessor, Auditor-Controller and TTC. She started as extra-help at the Office of the Assessor, working hard in the accounting series, which is a suite of positions requiring testing in each successive position. After working through Riverside City College, Kamal realized accounting and math came natural to her, so it's not a surprise that her career progressed in three agencies revolving around public finance.

Having a defined approach when dealing with the public on a daily basis is an effective best practice. "I normally manage the escalated inquiries. The approach is to stay calm, listen to them, explain the facts, and give them options for future payment methods so that the situation can be further avoided," said

- 1. Think positively! Positive thinking doesn't solve every problem or issue but you know the old saying about thoughts becoming things. Approaching change by determining the good that could come of it and focusing on that—whatever form that might take—helps manage expectations and erase negativity.
- 2. Exercise. I know, you're thinking this is another pitch for Fitness with Frank. And it is! Exercise makes you feel better and more confident and that leads to success in other areas, even if it's just getting through the workday with more energy. Exercise also helps with creativity and brainstorming when dealing with how best to accommodate change.
- 3. Take small bites. Too often we get burdened by too many to-do's as we're reacting to change and then get overwhelmed. Focus on one task at a time and make a point of crossing it off the list when it's done. This reinforces how work is a progression of accomplishments as opposed to a list of demands. (See #1.)
- 4. Be flexible. Most of you know this—it's one of the most exemplary traits of County employees that I encounter every day. But flexibility truly is the most potent work habit to engage when faced with changes to your routine.
- 5. Be kind. It may be corny but being kind—even when it's not returned by a frustrated member of the public or a colleague having a bad day—is a habit worth having because it lets you define who you are instead of allowing yourself to be defined by others.

Working at the County is a fast-paced, changing and challenging environment because so many people rely on us every day to do so many things essential for their lives. Thank you for your dedication and resiliency, and for the professionalism you show every day as a member of our County family.

Out of all of the agency experiences, Kamal admits Auditor-Controller tax unit was the greatest learning curve as she was exposed to the complicated world of cities, special districts and Community Facilities Districts (CFDs) and how each distinct set of funds are dispersed. She worked at Auditor-Controller for 10 years learning the 'lingo' and many acronyms which made a natural and easy transition to TTC. She's been there ever since.

One might think the public interface portion of the job would be as simple as collecting checks and bundling them for a bank deposit. Not at all. At the TTC, the remittance center relies on technology, including intricate hardware and smart software to process data. It takes account for payments made not only by the public, but also the many mortgage companies and banks who pay taxes twice a year for their customers through impound accounts---which represents 21% of all property tax payments. In addition to managing this process, Kamal also oversees the call center and public service counter along with her staff to find solutions for taxpayers.

In contrast to the busy and often byzantine world of public finance, Kamal's disposition is calm, informative and tempered with a light sense of humor — much attributed to where she was born and grew up until high school, in the islands of Fiji. Born into a Punjabi family on the island, Kamal recalls the beauty of her family's sugar cane farm built by her ancestors after moving to the island from India. Punjabis are natural farmers so it made sense for Kamal's family to grow and harvest sugar cane on a large ranch with horses and farm animals. In 1874, the British brought Indian contract laborers to help develop the islands. It was a time when one could have a "castaway life" living in a hut with access to waters full of fish, rich soil and other plentiful resources. The last time Kamal returned to Fiji was 10 years ago. She says, "Fiji still offers a castaway life, but now it's become a very expensive destination for visitors."

Water and sand follows her from Fiji to Orange County, and even on her vacations, because her choice of a holiday is Hawaii. At home, Kamal enjoys cooking for her family, and appreciates "farm-to-table" wholesome cuisine as she once had in Fiji. An avid Laker's fan, she was even witness to a game in 2009 when Kobe Bryant hit a game-winning buzzer shot against the Miami Heat. When she's not supporting the Lakers, Kamal and her family support the golf strokes of famous PGA golfer BJ Singh, who is also from Fiji.

OC History Journeys Through Orange County's Origins, Obstacles and Opportunities

The Golden Age of Oranges

Although there was no citrus industry here when the name "Orange County" was first suggested, we eventually more than lived up to our name. Orange County's Valencia oranges reached a peak of 77,000 acres in production in 1948. We also grew lemons, grapefruit and other citrus here. But for much of our history, the sunny orange defined us, promoted us, and drove our economy.

The gardens at Mission San Juan Capistrano were probably home to Orange County's first orange tree, beginning in the late 1700s. But oranges didn't make an impact here until 1870, when Anaheim Justice of the Peace William Hardin planted the seeds from two barrels of rotten Tahitian oranges and began to sell the resulting trees.


Our first Australian navel orange trees were imported and planted near Orange by Patterson Bowers in 1873. But it was the arrival of the Valencia orange – a native of the Azores – that proved the most important for Orange County's future.

The first Valencia grove in Orange County was planted in 1875 by Richard H. Gilman on the site of today's California State University Fullerton. Soon, Sheldon Littlefield – who later served as one of our first County Supervisors – planted another grove east of Fullerton. In 1895, Littlefield's grove was purchased by Charles C. Chapman, whose marketing and agricultural acumen, along with the natural sweetness and juiciness of the fruit, brought the Valencia to prominence.

Various influences bolstered the growth of our citrus industry. For instance, wine grape growers, whose vines had been devastated by Pierce's Disease, were looking for a new crop to grow just as oranges were coming to the fore. And the arrival of the railroads in the 1880s created a national market for locally grown fruit.


Citrus packing houses began to open across Orange County, often tied to cooperative associations of growers like the Anaheim Orange & Lemon Association or the Yorba Linda Citrus Association. Each local association was an important institution, providing not just agricultural infrastructure, marketing, and a bit of financial stability for growers, but also a sense of community.

The most important of these organizations was the regional Southern California Fruit Exchange – eventually known as Sunkist. They provided their members with scientific advice, astonishingly effective national advertising, and modern packing plants. They persuaded Americans that Valencias

were the best type of oranges, and that oranges were healthy and good for everyday eating — not just an exotic oddity. Beginning with a 1916 ad in the Saturday Evening Post, Sunkist also convinced Americans that the previously overlooked juice of oranges was the perfect drink to accompany breakfast.

Idealized scenes of a sunny, happy, prosperous, healthy Southern California accompanied Sunkist's vast marketing campaigns, and contributed greatly to migration from other parts of the country. California promoted the orange while the orange promoted California.

The scorecards are in. The National Procurement Institute (NPI) rated Procurement as a winner of the 2016 Annual Achievement of Excellence in Procurement. This is the third year Procurement won the award consecutively---2014, 2015, and 2016.

TheAchievementofExcellence in Procurementrecognizes organizational excellence in procurement. The criteria is designed to measure innovation, professionalism, procurement, productivity, and leadership attributes of the procurement function. A scorecard based on points is used by the judges. Some of the categories on the scorecard include, "Best Value Procurement Method" and "Procurement Ethics Standards." The group scored a perfect 100 percent in these two categories and in most.

The County of Orange is one of only 45 agencies in California, and one of only 48 counties in the United States and Canada to win the award.



Five Things You Need to Know to Prevent Drowning

- 1. Drowning is the leading cause of accidental injury and death in children under the age of 5 and can happen in less than 2 inches of water.
- 2. Small children and adults 50 years and older are the most at-risk groups for drowning incidents. There have been 199 drowning fatalities in Orange County since January 1, 2012. Tragically, 16 of those have already happened this year.
- 3. An OC Register story titled, "OC Parents Who've Lost Children to Drowning Share their Stories, and Urge Vigilance Near Water," profiled parents who joined representatives from the Health Care Agency, Orange County Fire Authority, Sheriff's Department, City of





- 4. There is no substitute for active supervision. While playing with your kids in or near the water, designate an adult in the group to serve as the official "Water Watcher" and monitor the children at all times. Download and print a free Safe Water Watcher Tag or pick one up from any Orange County Fire Authority Station near you. HCA's Health Promotion Division has distributed Safe Kids Orange County tags to all public pools in the County.
- 5. Drowning is a preventable tragedy. Never leave a child alone near water, even for a few seconds. At home, if a child is missing and you own a pool, check the pool first. View more tips at http://ochealthinfo.com/phs/about/family/mcah/dp.

He provided them with print material, resource pamphlets, and explained the benefits of filing a claim for disability compensation.



Earn an Accredited High School Diploma at the OC Public Libraries



The library is a learning place for the entire community. Currently, more than 480,000 adults in Orange County lack a high school diploma or equivalent. OC Public Libraries now offers two great programs to help adults complete their education.

Starting on September 12, OC Public Libraries will offer qualified community members the opportunity to earn an accredited high school diploma and credentialed career certificate through Career Online High School (COHS), part of the world's first accredited, private online school district. COHS is specifically designed to reengage adults into the education system and prepare them for entry into post-secondary career education or the workforce.

OC Public Libraries will award up to 10 scholarships for COHS to qualified learners looking to earn a high school diploma and advance their careers. Classes are supported by board-certified instructors and students have 24/7 access to the online learning platform. Coursework begins in one of eight high-growth, high-demand career fields, before progressing to the core academic subjects. Many students are able to graduate in as few as four to six months by transferring in previously earned high school credits. For those who aren't quite ready for their high school diploma, the library continues to offer free tutoring in basic reading and writing skills through OC READ, the adult literacy services of the OC Public Libraries. In OC READ, volunteer tutors work one on one with adult learners to help them gain the reading and writing skills they need for everyday life. OC READ learners work toward personal literacy goals such as reading to their children, filling out a job application, managing their health and finances, and more. Weekly tutoring is scheduled at a time and place convenient for the learner, in a comfortable and confidential setting. 

OC Public Works Shane Silsby Named Public Works Leader of the Year

Director of OC Public Works, Shane Silsby is American City & County magazine's 2016 Public Works Leader of the Year. Shane's achievements are many since his arrival to the County in November 2013.

Earning this prominent recognition is not only a reflection of his public works ideas and solutions, but also for his leadership and dedication to the staff at OC Public Works. It's not a surprise that Shane would be bestowed the award because in less than three years, under Shane's leadership, OC Public Works:

- Utilized strategic budgeting initiatives to achieve annual department-wide reductions to the General Fund operating costs,
- Produced the first fiscally constrained Sevenyear Capital Improvement Program to better promoted and manage the \$500 million plan,
- Utilized innovative alternate delivery methods to deliver County projects,

Prepare For The Great California Shake Out

With the annual Great California Shakeout scheduled for October it is a good time to remind ourselves about earthquake preparedness. Let's begin by knowing the simple steps for Earthquake Safety.

Before an earthquake strikes, plan to be safe. Secure your space by identifying hazards such as heavy unsecured objects. Moveable objects on top shelves should be removed to lower levels.



Falling furniture and flying objects can become projectiles during ground shaking. It only takes a few minutes to note hazards and take action to make your surroundings safer.

The most recognized protocol to protect lives during an earthquake is to -



Drop, Cover, and Hold On Wherever You Are!

- 1. Drop! to the floor before the earthquake drops you (i.e., near an interior wall)
- 2. Cover! by getting beneath a sturdy table or desk, covering your head with your hands and arms, and
- 3. Hold On! until the shaking stops

What Not To Do:

- 1. Do not get in a doorway!
- 2. Do not move in case the initial jolt turns out to be the start of the Big One!
- 3. Do not try to run outside!

How To Make Southeast Asian Lettuce Wraps: Larb Gai

Larb Gai is a high-protein salad enjoyed in Southeast Asia, primarily in Laos and regarded as their national dish. A variation is also eaten in Thailand and has become very popular in American Thai restaurants because of its low carbohydrate ingredients. It is eaten by filling lettuce leaves with the aromatic salad ingredients and Southeast Asian flavors such as: fresh mint, lime juice, Thai chile and fish sauce. The best part about Larb Gai is that it is easy to make, delicious and healthy. You can find all of the ingredients in local supermarkets or if you want to have a culinary adventure, visit an Asian foods market like 99 Ranch, H Mart or any "Little Saigon" supermarket. Across



the world, Larb Gai is made with variations according to regions. In this recipe, we added ginger for its anti-inflammatory properties, sesame oil for its unsaturated fat and basil for vitamin K.



Serves 4. 166 calories per serving

Ingredients:

1 lb. ground chicken

1 tsp. sesame oil

1 tsp. ginger root, diced

2 tablespoons sliced shallots

2 tablespoons finely chopped spring onion

1/4 cup (five leaves) chopped fresh mint leaves

1/4 cup (five leaves) chopped fresh basil leaves

OPTIONAL: 3 tablespoons roasted rice powder (Khao Koor); can be bought at an Asian market or make your own

2 tablespoons ground Thai chile

3 tablespoons lime juice

2-3 tablespoons fish sauce

Method:

The ground chicken can be purchased from the butcher at the supermarket, or ground chicken in your food processor.

Add sesame oil to frying pan. Cook the chicken in a pan over moderate heat. Stir until done. Transfer cooked chicken into medium mixing bowl. Add the remaining ingredients, and mix well. Taste and season as desired.

You might want more or less ground chile and/or fish sauce, etc.

Serve with fresh vegetables such as thinly sliced fresh cabbage, sliced radish, cucumber, and coriander leaves.

OPTIONAL: Serve with Thai jasmine rice.

How to Make Khao Koor: In a fairly hot medium sized wok or skillet, add a couple of tablespoons of uncooked jasmine rice. Keep in movement until the rice starts to turn golden brown. Remove from the heat and allow to cool. Grind to a fairly coarse powder in a spice mill, or a mortar and pestle. Don't grind it too fine--the powder should retain some "texture").

Workplace Safety - Fire Safety Month

As autumn begins, several safety tips are recommended for the season. Let's begin:

Fire prevention is a number one priority every year in California. Thousands of injuries and deaths occur due to preventable fires. Key fire prevention measures to ward off disaster include:

- Developing a fire protection plan at work as well as home to address potential fire hazards, ignition sources, and escape procedures each agency/department should have one for their facilities
- Being alert around electrical equipment and disconnect it if there are signs that it is not working properly or emits an unusual odor; and call Facilities Maintenance as appropriate



- Protect surge protectors/power strips from damage, do not plug one into another(i.e., "daisy chaining/cheaters"), and do not plug more than one into a wall outlet
- Make sure all heat-producing equipment/appliances are away from walls and anything that is flammable
- Ensure there is sufficient space for air to circulate around copy machines, computers, and other equipment that generates heat
- Use only Department and Safety Office approved space heaters
- Turn off coffee makers, hot plates, toaster ovens, etc., at the end of each work day
- Keep storage areas, stairway landings, and other out-of-the-way locations free of waste paper, empty cartons or other combustible materials that may cause a fire

This year's flu vaccine provides protection against influenza A and B viruses that are most likely to circulate in the upcoming season. Be sure to take precautions this flu season to prevent the spread of influenza and other infections. October is Cyber Security Month

For those who are big fans of 80s military movies, hearing the phrase "attack vector sierra papa" might bring to mind something right out of "Top Gun." Only this isn't fighter-pilot jargon—attack vectors are something we face daily – and sierra papa is phonetic for SP, or short for "spear phising."

We face threats to our County networks and information systems from a variety of "attack vectors." This is a cool term OCIT security folks use to describe the path or means by which an adversary (hacker) gains access to our network in order to steal, corrupt, destroy or deny access to the information stored on our systems.

The number one attack vector hackers use is a phishing campaign. Phishing is a scheme where an attacker masquerades, through email, as a legitimate entity in order to trick a victim into providing information, credentials or downloading malicious software. Spear phishing is a targeted phishing scheme to a specific person to achieve the same objectives as a phishing attack.

So, who would fall for phishing schemes? How about Target, Home Depot, Sony... All these companies had data breaches that started with a phishing campaign.

It looks like a legitimate email. It has the PayPal logo it may even have a spoofed (fake) PayPal email address.

Now here's the important part: You can infect your computer and the network just by clicking on the link.

If you are not 100% sure of the legitimacy of an email, don't open it; delete it! Contact your local security person or IT support staff for further assistance. If you are concerned about a financial matter, go directly to your bank website or call your customer service number from one of your statements.

OC Moves

91 Express Lanes and #1 General Purpose Lane Weekend Closures

OCTA in partnership with Caltrans is repaving the 91 Express Lanes along the SR-91 corridor between Orange and Riverside Counties. This project will require the closure of the 91 Express Lanes, and the #1 general purpose lane over a series of weekends beginning in September.

Branded "The 91 Weekend Shift," repaving is scheduled to occur over 10 consecutive weekends, 5 weekends in each direction and 1 direction at a time. Paving will begin in the eastbound direction from about SR-55 to the county line. Once repaving is finished in the eastbound direction, crews will repave the 91 Express Lanes in the westbound direction, from about the county line to SR-55. The tentative schedule is below.


